Takeaways from last week

- An unprecedented era of global forced displacement
- Differences between migrants, refugees, IDPs, people smugglers and human traffickers

Refugees Need Four Lives They must escape.....

- Persecution / death/ destruction of homes and families...if they manage to escape death
- 2. They face prolonged insufficiencies and lifethreatening conditions in relocation camps
- 3. If they escape the camps, they face a lifethreatening journey to find asylum
- 4. And then, they face the irony of life-threatening danger when they arrive to "safety"

Refugees Need Four Lives


 Persecution / death/ destruction of homes and families. If able to leave, they need a second life to weather.....










Refugees cannot stay in countries that don't offer asylum.....they need to move on...




But it will take their "third life" to do so....

- 1. One life is needed to escape persecution / death/ destruction of homes and families
- 2. A second life is needed to weather prolonged insufficiencies and life-threatening conditions in relocation camps and city streets

 But The journey to find asylum is lifethreatening.

Unlike Turkey, Greece offers asylum. But Why is the journey life threatening? TheGreek islands are close to Turkey




Why are they not flying? COUNCIL DIRECTIVE 2001/51/EC of 28 June 2001 supplementing the provisions of Article 26 of the Convention implementing the Schengen Agreement of 14 June 1985

- Whereas: (1) In order to combat illegal immigration effectively, it is essential that all the Member States introduce provisions laying down the obligations of carriers transporting roreign nationals into the territory of the Member States. In addition, in order to ensure a greater effectiveness of this objective, the financial penalties currently provided for by the Member States for cases where carriers fail to meet their control obligations should be harmonised to the extent possible, taking into account the differences in legal systems and practices between the Member States.
- (3) Application of this Directive is without prejudice to the Obligations resulting from the Geneva Convention relating to the Status of Refugees of 28 July 1951, as amended by the New York Protocol of 31 January 1967.
- So Refugees must risk their lives to find refuge. They can only apply for Asylum once they are in a country that offers it. Not before!

Once they arrive they need a fourth life They must:

- 1. Escape death at home
- 2. Escape life-threatening conditions in transit.
- 3. Escape death on the journey to find asylum.
- Escape life-threatening danger when they arrive to "safety"
- Two terms we need to know: Dublin and Schengen



From Greece, Refugees must keep moving



From Greece via Balkans to Hungary, Austria, & Germany before the border closings......



71 People died en route from Hungary to Austria in a smuggler's truck






A new chapter in the Crisis: EU closes Greek border to Turkey March 20

- March 18, 2016 EU-Turkey agreement
 - A one-for-one trade
 - 72000 Syrians from Turkey will be resettled in Europe
 - EU will give Turkey 6 Billion euros, provide visa-free entry to Europe and restart membership negotiations
- The Legal basis of the agreement:
 - "Irregular" migrants will be returned if they come from a "safe country of origin"
 - Asylum seekers can be returned to Turkey because it is considered a "safe third country"

Refugee Aid groups have protested

- "No Contracting State shall expel or return ("refouler") a refugee in any manner whatsoever to the frontiers of territories where his life or freedom would be threatened on account of his race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion." <u>Convention and</u> <u>Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees</u> Article 33
- <u>The Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European</u> <u>Union</u> says that "collective expulsion are forbidden" and the <u>UN Convention on Refugees</u>prohibits contracting parties from expelling or pushing back refugees.
- The EU Parliament defined *prima facie* refugees as nationals escaping conflict or generalized violence, for whom it is not necessary to hold an individual interview as it is generally evident why they have fled.





What changed in 2015? For Europe, there are Big 5 origin countries: Syria, Afghanistan, Kosovo, Eritrea, and Albania





Migrant route to Germany



Refugees need 4 lives

- If they stay home they may lose their life so they leave to survive
- Life in the camps and on the streets is often unbearable
 - Case of Turkey
 - But there are many helping hands to help make life bearable
 - But they must leave to gain asylum
- So they risk their lives to find real refuge
 - Many have died
 - Why don't refugees fly?
 - Many have come to the aid of refugees who land in Greece
 - Germany is welcoming
 - And refugees find shelter, food, schools, and work
- But Life is uncertain in lands that promise refuge
 - But Greece is now overwhelmed
 - Borders are closed
 - Volunteers bring aid
- And Europe is sending Refugees back to Turkey
